

### **VALUES**

Values. Values are sets of beliefs about good and bad, right and wrong, and how we live and interact with others (in our community and beyond). Values serve as a guiding force in life and provide a sense of direction. They are our *quidelines for living and behavior. Our values are a central part of who we are* and who we want to be. Our identity as a church is "held together" by our values and beliefs.

Have our values changed over time? If so, how? And why? If not, why not? Values change over time in response to changing life experiences. Recognizing these changes and understanding how they affect our actions and decisions as a church is an important part of clarifying our values. It's an ongoing process. "We

must adjust to changing times and still hold to unchanging principles. Grace, mercy, justice." (Jimmy Carter)

Values can be spoken and unspoken. Values can be positive or negative. Whether positive or negative, the values flow of what we believe (often we act in ways of which we are unaware because values are rooted so deeply).

Here are some examples of negative values we often observe in a church.

- Control: competition, intolerance, too few doing too much.
- **Insensitivity**: focusing on the shortcomings of others, people feeling left out.
- **Scapegoating:** blaming others, taking sides, avoiding personal responsibility.
- Poor communication: gossip, talking "about" someone with others rather than "to" someone + not challenging someone to avoid gossip, or to talk directly with the person rather than "triangle in" a third
- Self-centered: local of focus beyond ourselves, wanting things to please us, not wanting to do something different, lack of caring for people beyond the church.

Here are some examples of positive values we often observe in a church.

- **Communication:** respect, acceptance, honesty, healthy disagreement.
- **Hospitality:** sharing with others in multiple ways, welcoming, togetherness, good interpersonal relations.
- **Love:** caring, trusting, accepting.
- **Inclusivity:** sense of community, equality and equity.
- **Nurture:** comfort, care, flexibility, unity.

Our worship at the end of August focused on values. Your personal values. Our values as a church. I said our values must be relevant to the world in which we live. Relevant in ways that guide us to be the hands and feet, the eyes and ears, the voice of lesus. Relevant to our community and our unique context at the corner of Churchland Boulevard and Poplar Hill Road.

What is unique about who we are and what we do? What values do we hold that are unique to our church. In our community. Among all the other churches around us. Especially the churches who have the word Baptist in their name.

We considered several questions, framed around "What do we believe ...?" What do we believe about worshipping God? Worship is the most important thing we do together as a people of faith. (what are our values around worship?) What do we believe about missions? About global and community engagement? What do we believe about unity in diversity? What do we believe about growing disciples? About serving with love?

These are the questions that are facing us. These are the questions we must face as we continue to discern who God is calling us to be and what God is calling us to do. As we have the conversations, I hope you will join me. As we seek God's guidance about our values and our identity, I pray we will have the eyes to see. The ears to hear. And the heart to respond.

As we move into September and October, there will be conversations planned for us to talk about our values as a church. Be thinking. Be praying. Plan to be a part of the conversations.


# Thursday, September 28 7:00-8:30 pm Room 208 (enter at the church office door)




Option for a Daytime Discussion




